


SOLENT JUNIOR SCHOOL

Year 3

Since the start of the spring term, Year 3 have been following the Spelling Shed program for spelling, both in school and as part of their home learning. The children are loving the fun activities and in depth learning around spellings and phonics! From syllables and phonics to etymology of words, the children have been engaged and we are starting to see the application of these skills in their writing. Year 3

Year 3 have had a fun week learning about mass and capacity. Remembering facts like, 'How many grams are in a kilogram?' and 'How many ml are in a l?' have been integral to the progress in this unit. The children have learnt how to convert from g to kg and ml to l as well as finding the differences in measures and comparing them. Lots of different maths skills have been involved including using our previous learning on fractions, addition and subtraction and number tracks (scales). Some children even had the chance to get hands on too!

This week, Year 4 had their final week of swimming. The children were able to show off all of the progress they had made, and were given the opportunity to swim 25m. We have been so proud of the resilience and bravery shown by many of our less confidence swimmers over the last few weeks, and it has been great to see everyone get involved and give swimming a try. The children's behaviour at the pool has been exemplary , and we have been blown away at the speed in which they have shown they can get changed. Well done Year 4!
